Further support

Mrs Gray is responsible for monitoring progress and achievement of al Pupil Premium Pupils within the school.

Individual progress is reviewed with staff and appropriate intervention programmes are organised for those pupils who require them.

If your child is making expected progress then no additional intervention will be put in place. If additional intervention is required outside of lessons parents will be informed. These extra sessions will take place outside of core subjects and will be based around specific learning targets to allow your child to progress further.

The Early Years Pupil Premium

The Government has introduced the Early Years Pupil Premium Grant that is payable to schools for 3 and 4 year olds whose parents receive:

- Income Support
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16190).
- Working Tax Credit run on—paid for 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit

The amounts indicated are the grant available per eligible pupil within the academic year 2020/2021.

We are aware of most of our Pupil Premium Pupils but there may be some whose eligibility has not been brought to our attention.

How do we use the Pupil Premium Grant to support our pupils?

Nationally Pupil Premium Pupils perform below their peers and we are committed to closing the gap in attainment between out Pupil Premium Pupils and their peers. We look at all our pupils on an individual basis and decide how the Pupil Premium Grant can be best used to support their educational achievement and social development.

Details of our expenditure are published annually on our website but the following are examples of some of the ways we could use our grant to raise standards and increase opportunities:

 Specialist Teaching Programmes and resources such as 'Read/Write/Inc', 'Maths No Problem', 'I Can Read'

- Subsidising trips and music tuition
- · Provision of guided reading groups and reading mentors
- 1:1 tuition where appropriate
- Small group support for English and Maths
- Homework Club to provide access to computers and support.
- Purchase of specialised resources where appropriate.

What can you do to help your child?

Of course we recognise the contribution that parents make to helping their children and we encourage parents to be actively involved in supporting their children both at school and at home. These are some of the many ways you can help support your child at home:

- Take an interest in what your child does at school
- Take time to read with your child regularly, daily if possible
- Take time to know your child's timetable
- Ask daily if they have homework and find a quiet space in your house in which they can do it, helping if need be
- Ensure your child attends school regularly. Good attendance is so important
- Ensure your child arrives in school on time every day
- Do not take your child out of school during term time
- Make sure that you attend pupil/parent consultations so you can find out how to support your child with his/her targets
- Encourage your child to do extra research for subjects taught
- Visit local museums and attractions such as Woodhorn Museum
- Encourage your child to do a sporting activity such as swimming, football, cycling, walking etc.
