


End of year expectations

Year 1

Mathematics

- Count to and across 100, forwards and backwards, from any given number.
- Count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals.
- Count in multiples of twos, fives and tens from 0.
- Identify one more and one less than a given number.
- represent and use number bonds within 20.
- Represent and use subtraction facts within 20.
- Recognise, find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity.
- Compare, describe and solve practical problems for lengths and heights.
- Compare, describe and solve practical problems for mass and weight.
- Compare, describe and solve practical problems for capacity and volume.
- Compare, describe and solve practical problems for time.
- Tell the time to the hour and half hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times.
- Recognise and name common 2D and 3D shapes.



Reading

- Respond quickly with the correct sound to graphemes (letters or groups of letters) for all 40+ phonemes (sounds)
- Read accurately by blending sounds in unfamiliar words.
- Read many of the common exception words.
- Accurately, read aloud books that are deigned to help with phonic knowledge and that do not require any other strategies to work out words.
- Develop pleasure in reading by
 - 1. listening to, and discussing, books at a level beyond which they can read independently.
 - Becoming familiar with key stories and traditional tales, retelling them and discussing their characteristics.
- Understand books by
 - 1. checking that the text makes sense and correcting inaccurate reading.
 - 2. discussing the significance of the title and events.
 - 3. predicting what might happen based on what has been read so far.

Writing

- Spell words containing each of the 40+ phonemes (sounds).
- · Name the letters of the alphabet in order.
- Write from memory simple sentences dictated by the teacher.
- Form lower case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the correct place.
- Write sentences, sequencing them to form short narratives.
- Re-read what they have written to check that their sentences make sense.
- Use capital letters and full stops to demarcate sentences in some of their writing.
